In 2009, Molly, KNMB's Education Committee, and other educational partners will work together to further develop this program.

To do its job well, Keep New Mexico Beautiful will also, periodically, assess the needs of its membership & clients. This winter, KNMB will be asking you to tell us how we can best serve you. Your feedback will provide a basis upon which KNMB can better understand how to best organize itself in 2008 and beyond to carry out its mission.

Keep New Mexico Beautiful – Past, Present and Future

Keep New Mexico Beautiful has taken considerable time this year to reflect on its past, assess its present and chart a course for its future. This past March, the KNMB Board of Directors began a strategic planning process, assessing what they appreciate about KNMB and what works. In asking that question, they also asked, what do they want to take forward into the future? This process, although not yet fully complete, has resulted in a draft plan for KNMB's future and a shorter term action plan that jump starts priority initiatives. To understand what the future holds, we take a moment to review a few important elements of KNMB's past that have defined its mission and its future.

Keep New Mexico Beautiful 1965 - Present

Keep New Mexico Beautiful was founded in 1965 by Eunice Kalloch, as a continuation of the first governor-appointed statewide beautification committee. The original Board of Directors who worked on and drafted the KNMB mission and bylaws were Eunice Kalloch, Mary Olin Harrell, Harriet Ozler, Jim Grebe, Ernest McGovern, Fred Nelson, Clark Leedy, Mike Anaya, Ruth Bush and attorney Jim Toulouse. The hard work and commitment of these people led to KNMB's incorporation as a non-profit organization in June, 1967.

The actions of these directors launched litter control firsts in New Mexico. Dusty Roadrunner was hatched and designated the official state clean-up symbol in March, 1969. KNMB started the first recycling efforts in Albuquerque and Santa Fe and centers were set up in both cities in 1971. Also, in 1971, at the request of KNMB, the state legislature passed Joint Memorial 7 designating January 6th as "New Mexico Day" to celebrate the birthday of the state. Board of Director member Mike Maloof and his wife Dee chaired this event for many years. Mrs. Maloof to this day support this celebration.

In 1985, the New Mexico Legislature mandated that KNMB be the official statewide clearinghouse for litter control and beautification projects in the state by the Litter Control and Beautification Act (H.B. 198 as amended). This designation stipulated that KNMB may receive up to 10% of the monies collected for litter control and beautification by the state to carry out this mandate. This is the basis for today's KNMB Grant program, and other KNMB activities.

Due to the exceptional dedication of KNMB's members, board members and officers it has been recognized and received awards from Keep America Beautiful and New Mexico Clean and Beautiful. For example, Board of Director members Eunice Kalloch, Evelyn Prentice, and Mary Olin Harrell have received the Lady Bird Johnson award from Keep America Beautiful for their leadership and commitment to beautifying New Mexico. In the words of Margaret Meade, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."

KNMB Toda

Keep New Mexico Beautiful's mission is to support and encourage communities to improve their surroundings and promote civic pride statewide, through education, assistance, programs and recognition. This mission is carried out in multiple ways.

KNMB's Grant Program provides funds to community groups, schools, non-profit organizations, villages, towns, pueblos, cities and counties to carry out litter control and beautification projects. Through a grant from New Mexico Clean and Beautiful KNMB funds projects in five categories: Arbor Day, KNMB Month, Education, Solid Waste and Recycling, and Native Plants and Landscaping. This year, 48 grants were awarded to 38 different groups around the state totaling almost \$34,000.

The Dusty Roadrunner educational program reaches out to schools and communities through various activities and materials. Molly Madden, KNMB's new Environmental Education and Outreach Specialist is leading the Dusty Roadrunner on the Road program and carrying out waste audits with students and teachers in rural New Mexico schools this fall to teach important lessons on waste reduction. Dusty Roadrunner on the Road is made possible through a grant from the PNM Resources Foundation and the support of the US New Mexico Federal Credit Union.

In collaboration with New Mexico Clean and Beautiful two Dusty Roadrunner activity books were revised in 2007. "Fun with Dusty Roadrunner", a 3rd grade activity book, covers civics lessons such as the New Mexico state flower and bird, and important litter control topics. "Dusty Roadrunner Visits the State Monuments" takes 5th grade-level readers through New Mexico's natural treasurers such as Petroglyph National Monument in a fun and interactive way. A Spanish-version will be reproduced and available soon. KNMB supports activities every year that promote beautification and civic pride in our state and its environment. For example, each year KNMB awards a scholarship to a horticulture student at New Mexico State University. This year, Victoria Frietze was our scholarship winner. Congratulations Victoria! Also, in January, the State Birthday is celebrated in Santa Fe; Arbor Day and KNMB Month celebrations take place in the spring in selected communities; and our Annual Membership Meeting and Awards Ceremony is held in the fall. Dusty and KNMB also participate in events like the State Fair Parade, the International Green Ideas Show, and at Earth Day celebrations around the state.

Award of Excellence - Sierra Community Council, **Rotary Tree Planting**

Sierra Community Council planted a 33 tree windbreak of Arizona Cypress and Eastern Red Cedar at the southern end of Rotary Park, a new municipal park created by the Truth or Consequences Rotary Club. With technical guidance from the Sierra County Soil & Water Conservation District, two lines of trees were planted on the southern side of the park where they will effectively block the wind.

Award of Merit - Future Foundations Family Center, **Recreational Field Tree Planting**

This was a beautification project to support youth sports and outdoor development by planting trees at Earl Chavez Soccer Field. The trees planted were specifically selected because they are native to the southwest. They added to the beauty of the park as well as provided shade, and served as a wind block for athletes and spectators.

KNMB Month

Award of Excellence - Chamisa Elementary School, "Plant A Promise"

Chamisa Elementary School students planted red tulip bulbs and signed a promise that they will make healthy choices for their bodies. Then, in April, the tulips bloomed in a wonderful red mass reminding the children of their promise. April also happens to be alcohol awareness month as well as Keep New Mexico Beautiful month. Nearly 270 students participated in planting premium bulbs purchased with KNMB funds. The whole grant provides extreme curb appeal for the school.

Award of Merit - Shining Stars Preschool, The Stars Sensory Garden

As part of an on going beautification project, The Stars Sensory Garden filled two existing raised beds with splashes of color and textures. Since the planters are in the center of campus with the classroom doors opening onto them, everyone can enjoy the various colors and fragrances that the landscaping will provide.

Being the Change

Keep New Mexico Beautiful's history is steeped in individuals and small groups of people making a difference in their communities. From initiating the first litter control campaigns and creating the state litter control mascot (Dusty Roadrunner) to launching the first recycling programs in New Mexico, KNMB is successful because of the everyday actions of people like you.

At our Annual Awards ceremony this November 8th we will honor individuals, groups and businesses who have taken action to control litter, set up recycling programs, plant trees, landscape and beautify public spaces, and educate others on these topics. These people and organizations put valuable time and energy into (in the words of Mahatma Gandhi) being the change they want to see in the world. They created beautiful spaces for public use, developed educational materials and activities that re-connect our children to their natural world, and helped families and communities recycle their waste keeping it out of the landfill and off our land.

This year's KNMB award winners for outstanding grant projects include:

Award of Excellence - Carlos Rey Elementary School Campus Xeriscaping

Children in the Carlos Rev GATE (Gifted and Talented Education) class dedicated themselves to planning, planting, watering and weeding trees and shrubs on the elementary school campus. They learned to care for their gardens and teach others about the benefits of xeric gardening in a desert environment. (They were also instrumental in writing the KNMB grant proposal!) Five trees were planted and three areas xeriscaped with drought tolerant plants.

Award of Merit - Pecos Elementary School PTA, Greenhouse & Market

The Pecos Elementary Gardening Program works with all grades preparing and planting local vegetation and produce. The older grades participated in the Pecos Community Farmer's Market as an entrepreneurship learning experience. This project has benefited also from greater community collaboration, including donation of a greenhouse from the Santa Fe School for the Deaf.

Native Plants & Landscaping Award of Excellence - Angel Fire Garden Club, **Vietnam Veterans Memorial**

The Angel Fire Garden Club created a serene, inviting entrance to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Angel Fire. The project included replacing depleted soil with "Back to Earth" and goat manure, extending the irrigation system to service the entry gardens, planting high altitude plants, adding some annual color for Memorial Day and Independence Day, mulching, and keeping the area weeded, dead headed and well maintained throughout the year.

Award of Merit - The Wellness Coalition, **Lourdsburg Housing Authority Landscaping**

Forty-three native plants and trees were planted by an Americorps crew at the Lourdsburg Housing Authority. A short workshop on landscaping technique, the importance of using drought tolerant species, and the ecology of planting flowering native trees and shrubs to attract birds to the area was held with the crew.

Award of Excellence - Santa Fe Solid Waste Authority. **Materials Recovery Station virtual tour**

The Santa Fe Solid Waste Management Authority created a web-based virtual tour of the Material Recovery Facility at the Buckman Road Recycling and Transfer Station, in November 2007. A DVD and 200 duplicates were created of this tour to provide to schools and local municipalities. The DVD chronicles what happens to recycled waste once it leaves the curbside or drop off center, how recyclables are processed, and how they are turned back into new products for our every day use.

Award of Merit - Lincoln County Solid Waste, **Newspaper Collection**

This project supported a newspaper recycling initiative led by teenagers associated with the new Community Youth Center in lower Ruidoso. Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority purchased a 3 cubic yard dumpster and appropriate signage. This is the fourth step in developing a newspaper recycling site network within the Village of Ruidoso.

Best Overall - The Pueblo of Santa Ana, Pond Restoration and Education

This project receives the Best Overall award not only for its success at cleaning up and restoring Santa Ana Pond, but also for its educational outreach. Twentyfive youth and fourteen adults planted native plants at the site and learned about the ecology and hydrology of the pond. In addition, this project stands out for the quality of its grant application, reporting and educational materials.

At the Annual Awards Luncheon award winners will share more of their story about these projects with everyone. We will also honor and award the following individuals and groups for the contributions they have made to the Keep New Mexico Beautiful mis-



DUSTY ROADRUNNER ON THE ROAD



Dusty Roadrunner hits the ground running this fall conducting waste audits and teaching reduce, reuse, recycle themes in 18 elementary schools around New Mexico. The Dusty Roadrunner on the Road program, made possible by a grant from the PNM Resources Foundation, asks students and teachers to save their trash for a day and then weigh, measure and analyze the amount and type of trash they generated. The program not only teaches important lessons about waste reduction and management, but it also practices important grade-appropriate math and science skills. At the end of the lesson, students are asked to develop an action plan in which they identify practical ways they can reduce, reuse and recycle the waste they generate at their school. In addition, to off-set the carbon emitted by Dusty's travels and combat climate change, each participating school is given a tree to plant reach at events where KNMB can spread a message of on their school campus.

The Dusty Roadrunner on the Road program is directed and implemented by Molly Madden, the KNMB Environmental Education Specialist. Molly joined the Keep New Mexico Beautiful team this September and

brings with her over 20 years of teaching experience, and almost as many in environmental education.

In the first two weeks that Dusty and Molly were on the road they reached six schools, ten different 3rd, 4th, and 5th grades classes and 208 students in Valencia County. But Dusty's work doesn't end there. For the rest of October, he will reach eight more schools and twelve more classrooms in Milan (Cibola County), Gallup (McKinley County), Socorro (Socorro County), Estancia (Torrance County) and Ruidoso and Carrizozo (Lincoln County). Dusty's schedule for this fall is filling quickly, however a few spaces are still open. Let your favorite teachers and community organizers know that Dusty is available for presentations, appearances, and public outresponsibility and state pride.
